What happens when it rains?

An email will be sent via community pass from the Camp Directors by 8am day of camp if:

- Camp will not be in session
- Camp will be delayed, or
- Camp will be closing early
- When rain occurs while an outdoor session is in progress, and it appears the rain will continue, all those children at camp will be escorted to classrooms located adjacent to Our Lady Mother of the Church. Parents are expected to have an emergency plan in place to pick up their children from both camps (half & full day) should the need arise.
- Counselors will be on hand to assist parents arriving to collect their children
- No refunds will be given for any missed days, inclement weather days, transportation delays or dismissals from camp.
- Cancellations within 2 weeks of your session start date will receive 100% refund/1 week before, 50% refund.

The BLY & NARA Camp staff greets campers each morning. Arrival and attendance is taken at the Old Mill Pool entrance at 8:30am; same applies for before care at 8am. Pick up will be at the entrance to the pool at 12:30pm (half-day); 1:30pm (after-care) and 4:00pm (full-day).

A staff member will remain until all children have been collected; we ask that you be prompt.

With spring right around the corner, we are busy getting our ball fields prepped for opening day on April 29th, and the unveiling of exciting new offerings like the reservoir walkway and a community garden. SHADE TREE REPORT

2016 was a busy year for the borough Shade Tree Committee. There were three new members added and a survey was conducted of all the trees within the right of way in the borough. There were 4096 trees recorded and this will be used to monitor the status for future planning and control of problems.



Overall, 4% are dead, and 10% are in poor condition. The committee is working in concert with DPW to have dead trees removed and replaced by new healthy specimens ongoing. Just those 2 categories represent nearly 600 trees to review in the future.

If you are looking to beautify your property, add value and help global warming, we suggest you contact borough hall and look into getting a FREE street tree planted on your property, in the 10 foot right of way by your curb. Someone will discuss planting the right tree in the right place to give the tree a good start. The tree is planted at no cost to the homeowner and the area is checked to see if it will interfere with utilities in the area for planting. Welcome spring with a long lasting addition to your home.

The group is looking into the presence of a problem insect in our Ash trees. Nationally, there is a small insect that came here via ship from China and has begun to devastate the entire Ash tree population of the US. It is the Emerald Ash Borer or EAB. Imported from China, by mistake, over the last 14 years, it spread from the Midwest to the East and has been found in a neighboring town. Once it takes hold in a community, given a time frame of less than 10 years, the insect will create damage that kills all Ash trees. There are estimated to be about 2 billion Ash trees in the country and all are in jeopardy. Pine beetles, Chestnut Tree blight and Dutch Elm disease have resulted in tens of millions of trees gone or being cut down.

We are investigating the presence of EAB in our borough and what the options are. The town will need cooperation from the homeowners to overcome this potential problem. The insects don't care where the Ash tree is located. If we cut down every town Ash tree, they would attack homeowner's trees. And just because your Ash tree looks fine does not stop the spread of this relentless pest. It will eventually attack and destroy your own tree. It digs holes inside the tree that create channels and results in the inability of the tree to take up water - this spells the death of a tree. There is a county meeting on this subject in March and we will update you on progress.

There is a correct way to care for a tree that is planted on your property and that means that there should never be a mound of mulch placed high against the trunk of the tree. This results in a "volcano" type appearance where the mulch spreads out into the lawn. This cuts off oxygen to the branches and gives animals a place to spend the winter months in the mounded mulch. Much better to spread a thin layer of no more than 2 inches high mulch around the perimeter of the tree.

FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Several traffic related issues have been discussed regarding enforcement. This agency continues to be active on many traffic safety programs, including "Click-it-or Ticket", "Drive Sober or get Pulled Over" and "Put the Brakes on Fatalities", for which we receive grant monies. Please obey traffic laws, especially in the SCHOOL ZONES at drop-off and pick-up times. "Obey the Sign, or Pay the Fine".

Many area towns have experienced an upswing in home burglaries. As a reminder put lights on timers, set your alarms, be vigilant, and help us protect our neighborhoods. Burglaries can occur day and night, and no one knows your neighborhood better than you, so please trust your instincts and call immediately when something seems out of the ordinary.

Sgt. Bridget Jennings will be retiring from this department after over 21 years in law enforcement. Sgt. Jennings was the first female officer when she joined the police department in 1995 and was also the first female sergeant when she was promoted in 2013. Unfortunately, her career was cut short due to an injury. Sgt. Jennings will be missed by the other members of the department and we all wish her well in the future.

HEALTH CLINICS

The Board of Health provides blood pressure checks and general health information at no charge for residents of the Borough. The clinic is conducted by the Bergen County Department of Health Services and is held on the 3rd Thursday of every month except July and December, from 11:30 AM - 12:30 PM at the Tice Center on Chestnut Ridge Road. No appointments are required and adults of all ages may attend.

There is also a monthly Child Health Conference for Woodcliff Lake children from birth through age 6 where they may receive free, complete medical physical exams and all required immunizations. Children ages 7 through 18 years of age may receive immunizations only. Appointments are necessary. Sessions are held at the Borough of Hillsdale, 380 Hillsdale Avenue in the lower level. Further information and appointments can be made by calling (201) 666-4800 ext. 1528. Services are provided by a Pediatrician and a Public Health Nurse. There is no income requirement for this service.

Alkaline batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, 9V) can be disposed in normal trash.

No spring leaf pick up. Do not put leaves out. **They won't be picked up.** Leaves & grass are **Not** accepted at the Ecology facility. Use leaves & grass as a resource for compost. Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

Brush & branches are accepted at the ecology facility during normal operating hours only. **Brush must be tied in bundles or in a container when put out for cleanup day; brush/branches cannot be put out more than 24 hours in advance.**

Keep pollution out of storm drains:

Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains - Recycle used motor oil - Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Sewer Dept.

The Sewer Dept. maintains 40 miles of sewer line within the Borough including 5 pump stations. **We Need Your Help!** Some of our pump stations are experiencing clogs due to cleaning wipes and baby wipes. **Do not flush wipes.** Please discard these items in the trash.

Check the schedule or website; wclnj.com on holiday weeks as your regular pick up day may be rescheduled - Keep containers in good condition with tight fitting lids - Put items at the curb by 7:00AM for your cleanup day - Please call 201-391-3172 if you experience a problem with your garbage.
